While we were extremely grateful for the success of Operation Orange Ribbon, we wanted to do something more tangible to help the churches recognize the plight of the persecuted church. Our solution was to zero in on Nov 4th International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church, We put together what we call a "Kit" which included everything a church would need to promote and insure a meaningful service. The Kit included, ribbons & wristbands, a poster for promoting the day, handouts including, a prayer guide, list of the 50 most dangerous counties, OOR DVD, OOR pamphlet, sample sermon outlines, and instructions on when to do what. We invited 25 churches to participate and all 25 said yes. The feed back on the service and the materials provided has been great. We followed up with a survey to see how we could improve our program and all that responded said they would like to do it again next year. We will open up this program to a much larger group this year. The Lord continues to bless our mission.

Just two weeks ago we had the privilege of celebrating Christ's birth. It was a festive time for all of us with special church programs, parties, and dinners. It was a joyous time. We should never take this freedom for granite. Unfortunately this is not the case for over 200,000,000 Christians in other parts of the world. <u>Just a few examples</u>.

Risking Death in North Korea

In North Korea, Christianity is illegal—believers must celebrate Christmas in complete secrecy in the woods with a handful of Christians; in homes with candles and in whispers; or in the outhouses of prisons and labor camps.

"Incredibly, many North Korean Christians risk everything to gather on Christmas Day and remember the hope the first Nativity brought to the world," an Open Doors spokesman says. "A meeting is usually just two people on a park bench muttering prayers and praise quiet

In Somalia, Christmas was banned in 2015—six years after the country adopted Sharia (Islamic law). Every year, there is an announcement reminding citizens that the celebration of Christmas is illegal.

Celebrating Secretly in Saudia Arabia

In Saudi Arabia, churches, crosses and Christian meetings of any kind are illegal throughout the country. There are no churches and even the wearing of any kind of religious symbol is forbidden. A Christmas tree or lights outside are unthinkable. For Christian households, Christmas must be celebrated in secret

In Muslim-majority Tajikistan, no one publicly celebrates Christmas because it has been outlawed. A decree in 2015 by the education ministry in the former Soviet republic banned public displays of Christmas, particularly in schools and universities. That includes fireworks, festive meals and gift giving, as well as "the installation of a Christmas tree either living or artificial."

In Brunei, an oil-rich country on the island of Borneo in southeast Asia, anyone caught illegally celebrating Christmas could face up to five years in prison and a \$20,000 fine; owning a Bible in the small Muslim-majority country will get you nine years.

Our Christian brethren in these countries and many others need our prayers for them in 2019.

Here are five specific ways you can pray for persecuted Christians in 2019:

- 1. Pray that they will sense God's presence (Hebrews 13:5).
- Pray that they will see God open doors for them to witness for Him (Colossians 4:3).
- Pray that they will be able to forgive and love their persecutors (Matthew 5:44).
- Pray that they will experience the joy of the Lord, even amid suffering (Acts 5:41).
- Pray that they will know you and other Christians are praying for them (2 Timothy 1:3).

There are many ways you can volunteer in the OOR mission, such as assemble ribbons and bage wristbands, pass out materials, etc. One of the most unique ways was by Mike Christon. Mike and his wife Michelle are new to the area and will be a great addition to our community. Mike took the time and effort to write an article for OOR news letter. This article was well written with a great amout of thought and resarch.

The First Christian Martyr

The apostle Paul, in his final letter before his death, wrote "...
all who desire to live godly in Christ Jesus will suffer persecution" (2
Tim 3:12).

Acts chapters 6 & 7 document the ministry of Stephen who was the first martyr of the early Christian church. Using the acronym F.A.I.T.H. and the narrative of the scriptures, we can clearly see the power of God working in His servant Stephen. The lessons gained can help us to better pray for those giving their lives for the cause of the gospel.

<u>Full of the Holy Spirit</u>. This term characterized Stephen from the time he was chosen to serve Christ (Acts 6:8) until the moment he was stoned to death by an angry mob of religious leaders (Acts 7:55). Pray that the persecuted would be "full of the Spirit" (continually under Gods control).

Announce the Gospel truth. Stephen boldly proclaimed a defense of the Christian faith starting with the Old Testament. The religious leaders were reminded how they rebelled and disobeyed God. (Acts 7:51-53). Pray that the gospel message of the persecuted would be bold to a lost world.

Invitation to receive Christ. Stephen's message was so convicting that the only two possible responses were to repent and receive the LORD or refuse and face judgement. (Acts 7:54). Pray that many would repent and believe as the persecuted proclaim the gospel.

Throne of God. Stephen "gazed into heaven and saw....Jesus standing at the right hand of God" (Acts 7:55b). The LORD was with His servant. Pray that the persecuted would fix their eyes on Jesus.

Heart of forgiveness. Stephen said "LORD do not charge them with this sin" (Acts 7:60). Leave vengeance to God (Romans 12:19). Jesus said, "pray for those who persecute you" (Matthew 5:44). Who knows, Stephen's final prayer may have contributed to Saul's repentance. Saul became Paul the apostle and was used mightily by God. Pray that God would cause all things to work together for good (Romans 8:28) and that Christ would ultimately be glorified (1 Peter 4:16).

OOR Financial Assistance

We met with a missionary from South Sudan several months back. He and his family were force to relocate twice in South Sudan because of an ongoing military conflict. When they were forced to move with no notice leaving everything behind, the house was looted and then burned to the ground. When they relocated, within a very short time, fighting broke out at their new location. He and his family, wife and 3 sons, spent two days lieing on the floor of their house to avoid flying bullets. When there was a loll in the shooting they we able to escape to Uganda. They relocated to a refugee camp for South Sudanese, where he continues his misnitry. OOR was able to provide some financial assistants.

We recently met with a misionary member of the IMB. This person is involved with missions in Cental Asia and Western China. We agreed to work together and develope a project in that area. More information to come as detail develope.
