November 1st is INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE PERSECUTED CHURCH. OOR has worked extremely hard to emphasize this day and to get as many churches as possible to make this a special day of prayer.

Remember Sharon, the young lady that was raised in an orphanage and Kibera, the largest slum in Africa? Despite all the hardships, Sharon rose above them and was able to graduate from high school. Sharon was discipled by our friend Angelica and was baptized at the age of 12.

Her faith and, the love and care of the church, Julio and Angelica planted in the slum of Kibera, helped her to overcome many of the hardships such as starvation, living conditions, and gang violence. Her greatest dream was to go on to college and work in the medical profession where she could help others. After she graduated it became clear that this dream was an impossibility, without Devine intervention. Just to survive she found herself doing whatever menial job that would provide food. Sharon was quickly being trapped into the cycle of poverty of Kibera, and was becoming very despondent.

You can imagine how thrilled she was when she found out that Angelica had brought her situation to the attention of Operation Orange Ribbon, and that we agreed to fund her tuition, living expenses and a laptop computer.

A few days after she was enrolled in college and housing was obtained someone broke into her room and took the computer away from her. She was not physically harmed, but emotionally devastated. The computer is especially important to her since her classes are virtual this semester. OOR will endeavor replace it.

In the last several newsletters I have mentioned Angelica and Julio Quirino many times. They have been extremely important to OOR in the mission field of Kenya. They are in a perfect position to point us to areas that fit our mission statement. Working together this has been an extremely rewarding partnership. I wanted to give you a closer look at this amazing couple doing amazing things for our Lord.

Below is some of their history.



Julio and Angelica Quirino have been serving with AIM, Africa Inland Mission, since 1996. Julio is from Brazil and Angelica is from Bolivia. They have two children Raquel (24) and Samuel (20). Their sending church is from Brazil: 1era Igreja Batista de Campo Grande MS Brasil. (1st Baptist Church in Campo Grande MS Brazil.)

They started out reaching the S. people in Nairobi, Kenya in 2000 where they remained for 18 years. They arrived in Africa with their hearts full of passion to see the S. unreached, coming to faith in Jesus. Their first fruits in ministry are now taking the Gospel to the S. people. In 2009 until 2010 they led a TIMO team (Training in Ministry Outreach) in Nairobi. Afterwords, they started an outreach in Kibera slums (Nairobi) and planted a church that continues doing outreach in the slums. After 18 years in Nairobi, Kenya doing church planting and discipleship, God led them to move to Mombasa, coast of Kenya, where they serve as Missions Mobilizers. Their ministry is to train and equip pastors, church leaders, missionaries, young believers, professionals for spiritual growth and spiritual leadership aiming to see unreached people groups reached with the Gospel. They are also involved in Bible Studies and Discipleship to former M. and other Kenyan Disciples. They still disciple their spiritual children from Nairobi and other areas of Kenya. Their dream is to see many African missionaries being mobilized, trained, and sent by their local churches to the unreached groups in Africa.
